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I. Introduction

Chapter 394, Florida Statutes (F.S.), The Florida Mental Health Act, also known as the "Baker Act," includes several data reporting requirements. Specifics of data submission requirements are described in <u>Florida Administrative Code 65E-5</u>, which includes directing providers to send forms to the Baker Act Reporting Center at the University of South Florida. Forms must be submitted to the Baker Act Reporting Center within one working day after the person arrives at the receiving facility (Section 394.463 F.S.).

Forms submitted to the Baker Act Reporting Center include:

The Cover Sheet (<u>CF-MH 3118</u>) was implemented in 1999 to systematically report client demographic and provider information. Designated Baker Act receiving facilities submit a Cover Sheet (<u>CF-MH 3118</u>) on top of each initiation form and Ex Parte Order for Involuntary Examination (<u>CF-MH 3052a</u>, <u>CF-MH 3052b</u>, and <u>CF-MH 3001</u> or its equivalent). Links to the statute, administrative code, forms, and other materials can be found on <u>The Department of Children and Families (Department) Crisis Services – Baker Act web page</u>.

Section 394.463(2)(e) F.S. requires the Department of Children and Families (Department) to submit an annual report to the President of the Florida Senate, the Speaker of the House of Representatives, and the minority leaders of the Senate and House of Representatives. This annual report is published on the Department's website.

Staff at the Baker Act Reporting Center at the University of South Florida produced this report under contract LH292 with the Department. Although this is considered the statutorily required annual report for FY17/18, additional years of data were used for analyses. II. Report Highlights

- There were 205,781 involuntary (Baker Act) examinations in Fiscal Year 2017/2018 (FY17/18).
- Involuntary examinations increased 2.92% from FY16/17 to FY17/18, 16.26% from FY13/14 to FY17/18, and 53.98% from FY08/09 to FY17/18. Involuntary examinations more than doubled (115.31% increase) in the 17 years from FY01/02 to FY17/18.
- From FY13/14 to FY17/18, statewide involuntary examinations increased 18.85% for children, 14.04% for young adults (18-24), and 12.49% for older adults.
- Three-quarters (73.55%) of involuntary examinations in FY17/18 were for adults aged 18 through 64, with 17.53% for children, and 7.41% for people 65 and older. [Age was unknown for 1.51%.]
- 51.67% of involuntary examinations were initiated by law enforcement, with 46.31% initiated by professional certificate, and 2.02% initiated via ex parte order.
- Physicians who are not psychiatrists (68.04%) were the most common health professional to initiate involuntary examinations, followed by psychiatrists (9.28%), licensed mental health counselors (9.29%), licensed clinical social workers (5.33%), psychiatric nurses¹ (2.02%), psychologists (1.27%), Physician Assistants (<1%), and licensed marriage and family therapists (<1%). Children were more likely than other age groups to have their involuntary examinations initiated by licensed mental health counselors and social workers.
- Evidence Type: Over half (56.83%) of involuntary examinations were based on evidence of *harm only*. Almost one-third (30.47%) were based on *both harm and self-neglect*. Less than ten percent (9.47%) were based on evidence of *self-neglect only*. Self-neglect only (no harm) was more common with increased age. [Evidence type was not reported for 3.22%.]
- <u>Harm Type</u>: Harm can be further broken down into harm to self and/or harm to others. More than half (55.84%) of all involuntary examinations were based on evidence of *harm to self only*. One in five (21.52%) were based on *both harm to self and harm to others*. Harm to others only was the evidence for 5.55% of all involuntary examinations.
- <u>Suicide and Self-Harm:</u> Three-quarters (77.36%) of involuntary examinations were based evidence of harm to self (either by itself, or in combination with harm to others and/or self-neglect). Self-harm includes suicidal ideation a suicide attempts. However, it is important to understand that self-harm is not synonymous with suicide. Self-harm can also include behaviors such as cutting and bodily harm that does not have suicidal intent.
- Rates per 100,000 population for deaths by suicide and involuntary examinations over a ten year period were positively and significantly correlated statewide for all ages (r = .71, p < .05), children (r = .92, p < .01) and older adults (r = .78, p < .01). These correlational findings do not imply causation. Further, these significant correlations were not seen in all counties. These relationships will be explored in future years to understand the dynamics related to them, including additional ("third") variables that may be related to the correlations and differences across counties. Rates of suicide are included in this report to provide additional context to readers (see Appendix C).
- More than half (59.53%) of involuntary examinations in FY17/18 were at publicly funded receiving facilities, with 40.47% at privately funded receiving facilities.





Figure 2: Involuntary Examinations by Age Groups

- New to the annual report are details about transition-aged young adults (aged 18-24). Figures 1 and 2 present counts for all ages of involuntary examinations year by year by age group. The percentage of change in the number of involuntary examinations from FY16/17 to FY17/18 is reported at the facility level for all ages (see Table 7).

¹ "Psychiatric nurse" means an advanced practice registered nurse licensed under s. 464.012 who has a master's or doctoral degree in psychiatric nursing, holds a national advanced practice certification as a psychiatric mental health advanced practice nurse, and has 2 years of post-master's clinical experience under the supervision of a physician.

III. Involuntary Examinations

A. Technical Notes

Understanding what the data are <u>not</u> is as important as understanding what they are when considering related policy decisions. The Baker Act data analyzed for this report are from examination initiation forms received by the Baker Act Reporting Center. However, some individuals for whom forms were received were never admitted to the receiving facility because an examination by a physician or psychologist performed prior to admission determined they did not meet admission criteria. The data also do not include information on what occurred after the initial examination. For example, the data do not reveal how long individuals stayed at the facility, whether they remained on an involuntary or voluntary basis, or whether the involuntary (Baker Act) examination was converted to a Marchman Act assessment.

<u>Redaction</u>: Cell sizes smaller than 25 Baker Act examinations were redacted from this report. The purpose of this redaction is to prevent identification of people. <u>Terminology:</u> Involuntary examinations occur at designated *receiving facilities*. Receiving facilities may include hospitals (licensed under 395 F.S.) and Crisis Stabilization Units (licensed under 394 F.S.). The Department designates all Baker Act receiving facilities regardless of type. Some receiving facilities are called Crisis Stabilization Units (CSUs). CSUs are usually inpatient units of community mental health centers and receive Department funds for Baker Act services. CSUs designated for children are referred to as Children's Crisis Stabilization Units (CCSUs). This means that while all CSUs/CCSUs are Baker Act receiving facilities, not all Baker Act receiving facilities are CSUs. The abbreviations CSU and CCSU are used throughout this report. Receiving facilities that are provided funds from the Department are referred to later in this report as "public," while those not receiving such funds are referred to as "private." When the phrase "The Department" is used in this report, it is referring to the Florida Department of Children and Families.

All analyses in this report used the County of Residence (see Table 7).

There are complex reasons for the lower numbers of involuntary examinations in some areas and higher numbers in other areas. Readers of this report are urged to consider these factors when interpreting the results. For example, the distribution of Baker Act receiving facilities statewide is not uniform. About half of Florida's 67 counties have at least one Baker Act receiving facility, about half do not having a receiving facility. Areas of some counties are geographically distant from the nearest receiving facility. Additional factors may influence the use of involuntary examination, such as:

- Number of people trained in Mental Health First Aid
- Law enforcement training, including Crisis Intervention Training (CIT)
- Availability of criminal justice system diversion programs at all sequential intercepts, including those funded by Criminal Justice, Mental Health, and Substance Abuse (CJMHSA) Reinvestment Grants
- Availability and quality of community-based behavioral health services, including mobile response teams
- Availability of a wide array of social services such as assistance with housing, coverage for health care, and existence of county funds for those who are underinsured or uninsured.

Population statistics are provided in some tables to put counts of involuntary examinations in context. Population estimates were obtained from the Florida Office of Economic and Demographic Research. County level characteristics were obtained from the Florida Department of Health, Division of Public Health Statistics and Performance Management, and the Florida Health Charts. While this report focuses on counts by fiscal years, estimates of population are available by calendar year. Logical calendar year spans are used to provide context.

B. Involuntary Examinations: State Level Analyses

There were **205,781** involuntary examinations in FY 17/18. Three-quarters of involuntary examinations were for adults aged 18 through 64 (n = 151,345, 73.55%), with 17.53% (n = 36,078) for those less than 18, and 7.41% (n = 15,253) for people 65 and older. Young adults (age 18-24) accounted for 12.79% of involuntary examinations statewide. There were 3,105 (1.51%) forms where age was unknown because a valid date of birth was not included on the Cover Sheet. Counts of involuntary examinations for the last 17 fiscal years are reported for all ages, children (<18), transition-aged young adults (18-24), and older adults (65+) (see Table 1. and Figure 1.).

² The population statistics used to compute involuntary examinations rates per 100,000 are age specific. For example, the denominators used to compute the rates per 100,000 for children were for children 5 through 17, for young adults for the population 18 through 24, and for older adults for the population 65 and older. The age range 5 through 17 was used for children because including the population of children from birth through age 4 (who are not typically subject to involuntary examination) would incorrectly lower the rate per 100,000 for children.

Changes in Population vs. Changes in Volume of Involuntary Examinations: Because population estimates for fiscal years were not available, population increases were calculated for the calendar years closest to the fiscal years reported. Population estimates were obtained from the Office of Economic and Demographic Research. The increase in the number of involuntary examinations was greater than the Florida population increase for all ages and the three age groups from FY 07/08 to FY 17/18 (see columns A and B in Table 2). Over the last fiscal year (FY 16/17 to FY 17/18) involuntary examination increases exceeded population increases, except for young adults (18-24) (see Columns C and D in Table 2).

The increase over time for all three age groups is shown in Figure 1. Figure 2 shows counts for children, young adults, and older adults, but does not show the counts for all ages. This allows the scale of Figure 2 to be from 0 to 40,000, which allows us to see the pattern of increase in the age groups that is not possible in Figure 1 given the scale that is needed to show the count for all ages.

Figure 1: Involuntary Examinations for 17 Fiscal Years for All Ages, Children, Young Adults, and Older Adults




The percent change in involuntary examinations from one year to the next is shown in Table 3 and Figure 3.

³ Note that the scale of Figure 3 is from slightly less than zero (to account for the few years with slight decreases) up to a max of a 15% change from one year to the next.

Counts of involuntary examinations by age group are presented in Table 4. The percentage of total examinations and the percentage within each age group are both included. For example, involuntary examinations for adults aged 65 to 74 accounted for 4.71% of all involuntary examinations during the fiscal year and 62.56% of involuntary examinations for older adults (65 and older).



<u>Initiation Type, Evidence Type, and Harm Type</u>: Initiation type, evidence type, and harm type for involuntary examinations in FY17/1817 are summarized in Figure 4.

Initiation Type: 51.67% of the involuntary examinations in FY17/18 were initiated by law enforcement, with almost half initiated by professional certificate (46.31%). The remaining 2.02% were initiated via ex parte order.

Figure 4: Initiation Type for FY17/18







Evidence Type: Over half (56.83%) of involuntary examinations were based on evidence of harm only. Almost one-third (30.47%) were based on harm and self-neglect. Less than ten percent (9.47%) of involuntary examinations were based on evidence of self-neglect only. Evidence type was not reported on forms for 3.22% of involuntary examinations.

Harm Type: Evidence of harm can be further reported according to harm type (see Figure 6). Harm can be further broken down into harm to self and/or harm to others. More than half (55.84%) of all involuntary examinations were based on evidence of harm to self only. One in five (21.52%) of all involuntary examinations were based on both harm to self and harm to others. Harm to others only was the evidence upon which 5.55% of all involuntary examinations were initiated. The most striking aspect of Figure 6 is how similar the proportions are across age groups of harm and evidence type combinations. Neglect only (no harm type) was more common as age increases.



The involuntary examination initiation forms do not contain categorical data elements to indicate if a person attempted suicide or had suicidal ideation associated the initiation of their involuntary examination. Three-quarters (77.36%) of involuntary examinations were based evidence of harm to self (either by itself, or in combination with harm to others and/or self-neglect). Self-harm includes suicidal ideation a suicide attempts. However, it is important to understand that self-harm is not synonymous with suicide. Self-harm can also include behaviors such as cutting and bodily harm that does not have suicidal intent.

Rates per 100,000 population for deaths by suicide and involuntary examinations over a ten year period statewide (based on rates per year) were positively and significantly correlated for all ages (r = .71, n = 10, p < .05), children (r = .92, n = 10, p < .01) and older adults (r = .78, n = 10, p < .01). It is likely that there are one or more additional variables/phenomenon related to the relationship of rates of suicide to involuntary examination rates. In addition, these significant differences were not seen in all counties. Information about caution that should be taken when interpreting suicide rates as well as detailed tables with counts of death by suicide are in Appendix C.

C. Involuntary Examinations: Provider Level Analyses

Counts of involuntary examinations in FY16/17 and 17/18 for each receiving facility are reported in Table 6. Facilities are listed by the Department region, then alphabetically by facility county within each the Department region, then in descending order by number of involuntary examinations. Counts for most providers that have both CSUs (crisis stabilization unit) and CCSUs (children's crisis stabilization unit) are counted separately for CSUs and CCSUs. Also reported is the percent change in involuntary examinations from FY16/17 to FY17/18.

There are several reasons why the number of involuntary examinations at a receiving facility increase or decrease over time. Cells with a ** in the "% Change" column mean that the percent change is not available or meaningful due to changes in facility designation. Change over time in the use of Baker Act examination is a complicated issue. Those wanting make conclusions about this change over time are encouraged to contact the Baker Act Reporting Center to discuss possible factors related to change over time (bakeract@usf.edu).



The distribution of involuntary examinations at public and private receiving facilities is shown in Figure 7. "Public" in this context means the receiving facility received funds from Department for Baker Act examination services, while "private" receiving facilities did not receive funds from the Department. Children (73.13%), transition-aged young adults (59.23%), and adults (57.77%) are more likely to have involuntary examination at public receiving facilities as compared to older adults (public = 41.69%). The meaningful percentage of involuntary examinations at privately funded receiving facilities are essential to understand the use of involuntary examinations.





Some Baker Act receiving facilities are owned by a large corporate entity. For example, one in six (16.47%) involuntary examinations in FY17/18 were at Hospital Corporation of American (HCA) owned facilities, with 8.27% at Universal Health Services (UHS) run receiving facilities, 6.57% at BayCare Health Systems owned receiving facilities, 3.87% at Tenet Health facilities, and 2.46% at Baptist Hospital Corporation owned facilities.

D. Involuntary Examinations: Geographic Area Reporting

Data for FY 17/18 were analyzed for each of Florida's 20 judicial circuits, 6 Department of Children and Families regions, and 7 Managing Entity (ME) areas.

County of residence, as reported by Baker Act receiving facilities on the Cover Sheet, was used to categorize by county. These analyses are based on **191,630** involuntary examinations because **14,151** (6.88%) did not have county of residence reported on the Cover Sheet necessary to categorize those involuntary examinations into these geographic categories.

Caution should be applied when interpreting changes for counties with smaller populations and fewer involuntary examinations. "Changes in small numbers can lead to large, but meaningless, increases or decreases to percent change." This is because small changes in numbers of involuntary examinations can account for larger percentage.

E. Involuntary Examinations: County Specific Analyses

Data for FY 17/18 were analyzed for each of Florida's 67 Counties.

County of residence, as reported by Baker Act receiving facilities on the Cover Sheet, was used to categorize by county. These analyses are based on **191,630** involuntary examinations because 14,151 (6.88%) did not have county of residence reported on the Cover Sheet necessary to categorize those involuntary examinations into these geographic categories. Percentages in Tables A and B of the county pages are computed *horizontally* such that they indicate for residents of each area, the percentage of age and initiation type. For example, Alachua County residents had 2,573 involuntary examinations in FY17/18, with 40.26% initiated by law enforcement, 58.14% by professional certificate, and 1.59% by ex parte order.

Please Note:

- Some percentages do not sum to 100% due to rounding.
- Some counties do not have a receiving facility. This means that people are brought to Baker Act receiving facilities in other counties. It is important to keep this in mind when reading results at the county level.
- Redaction: Counts below 25 were redacted for tables in this report. The symbols *** indicate that counts for that cell were redacted because they were less than 25.
- Population statistics were obtained from The Office of Economic and Demographic Research (EDR) of the Florida Legislature. EDR provides updates to population statistics several times each year. This report used the April 2017 EDR estimates.
- Select community characteristics obtained from Florida Health Charts are provided for each county.
- The maps included on the County pages were created by the U.S. Geological Survey and are considered public domain. They were obtained from the county pages that are part of the <u>Wikipedia: Wiki Project</u> U.S. Counties/County Lists.
- Following is information about interpreting Table A in the county specific tables starting on page 30.
 - The "% Change in Exams for All Ages 2017/2018" may be compared to the "% Change in Population All Ages to 2017" to determine how much of the change in involuntary examinations can be accounted for by population change. Following are a few examples:
 - o Involuntary examinations for Hillsborough County residents <u>decreased</u> 12.3% from FY16/17 to FY17/18, while the population increased by approximately 1.96% during that time (see p. 57).
 - o Involuntary examinations for residents of Duval County <u>increased</u> 15.79% from FY16/17 to FY17/18, while the population <u>increased</u> approximately 1.43% during that time (see p. 44).
 - o Involuntary examinations for Bradford County residents <u>increased</u> 54.38% from FY08/09 to FY17/18, while the population decreased approximately 4.88% during that same time (see p. 33).
 - o Involuntary examinations for Jackson County residents <u>decreased</u> 7.69% from FY14/15 to FY17/18, while the population had almost no change (increase of 0.37%) (see p. 60).
- <u>Data on Deaths by Suicide</u>: The one page statewide summary (p. 29) and one-page county summary pages contain information about rates of suicide per 100,000 population. Additional information about deaths by suicide is provided in Appendix C (p. 103).

Appendix C: Deaths by Suicide in Florida: Additional Details

While rates per 100,000 population for deaths by suicide and involuntary examinations were positively and significantly correlated at the state level (Table C1), this same relationship was not seen in all counties (Table C2). Additional analyses if data more counties and more in depth analyses than have been conducted for this report will allow us to further understand the complicated relationship between deaths by suicide and involuntary examination.



Variability

The rates of suicide per 100,000 population for 2014 and 2017 shown in the county specific pages need to be interpreted with caution. Statewide rates are more stable than rates for counties, especially counties with smaller populations. Trends in the data over longer periods than three years are more indicative of patterns of deaths by suicide.

Figure C1: Rates of Deaths by Suicide – All Ages - Statewide



Smaller counties, such as Okeechobee and Washington, show more variation than statewide for rates of suicide per 100,000 population. The 2017 populations were as follows for Okeechobee County (41,469) Washington County (24,935). The years that are chosen for comparison to each other will affect the percent change over time. For example, choosing the difference between rates per 100,000 population from 2014 to 2016 in Okeechobee County shows a decrese of 0.6 per 100,000, while the difference between 2011 and 2015 is 15.2. Neither figure provides an accurate representation of the pattern of suicide in Okeechobee County.⁸

Figure C1: Rates of Deaths by Suicide – All Ages – Okeechobee County





Figure C2: Rates of Deaths by Suicide – All Ages – Washington County

Addressing this issue fully for all counties and multiple age groups is beyond the scope of this report. However, the number of deaths by suicide and the rates per 100,000 population over multiple years and for all ages, children, and older adults are provided on the following pages so that readers of this report have easy access to this information to put the data on deaths by suicide into context for their geographic area of interest. Counties with somewhat larger populations, such as Duval (2017 population = 942,841) and Marion (2017 population = 352,067) show variation in the rate per 100,000 population, but less so than the Okeechobee and Washington. Looking for the overall trend of the data over longer periods of time provides more usefull information than trends over shorter periods of time.

Figure C4: Rates of Deaths by Suicide – All Ages – Marion County


